What to expect following surgery

Your child will be **observed closely** and given regular pain relief. We will advise you when your child can start eating and drinking again as his/her condition permits.

Your child needs to have passed urine after their operation. He/she will be allowed home at the discretion of the doctor or nurse. This is usually the same day for day cases and the following day for in-patients.

Pain control

Some pain relief may have been given before or during your child's operation. It is important to give regular Paracetamol/Calpol for at least the first 3 to 4 days at home.

Please give this according to the instructions.

What are the complications?

No operation is entirely risk free. The risk of serious complications following adenoidectomy is very low. The main post operative risk is bleeding and infection. This can occur at any time until the place where the adenoids were removed from has healed.

This can happen within a few hours after the operation. Usually it stops by itself but occasionally it may require further treatment.

In the event of bleeding bring your child immediately to Accident and Emergency

There may also be some temporary minor health problems, such as sore throat, ear-ache or blocked nose for a few weeks. However, most children have a totally uneventful recovery.

School

Your child can usually return to school a week after their operation. During this time it is best if you avoid close contact with people who have coughs and colds.
