When will I get the results?

The doctor or nurse will speak to you before you leave and explain what was seen and done during the test.

Your test was normal, no follow up is required
You will need another endoscopy procedure

What advice do I need after throat spray?

A local anaesthetic spray has been used to numb your throat during the procedure. This will normally take 1 hour (60 minutes) to wear off.

Therefore, **DO NOT EAT OR DRINK for 1 hour (60 minutes) following your procedure**.

Instructions for testing the sensation in your throat:

You can take a sip of cold water at_____

If you do not have any problems with swallowing you may start eating and drinking as normal. If you cough or have difficulty in swallowing, please do not drink for another 30 minutes.

Repeat this process until you can swallow normally. You may suck a sweet if your mouth is dry. The sensation in your throat normally returns within 30 minutes but may take up to 2 hours.

What advice do I need after sedation?

You have had a sedative injection. Even though you feel wide awake the sedation can affect the way you think and behave for up to 24 hours afterwards. For this reason you need to have someone who can look after you when you go home.

Please note if you have had sedation, for 24 hours you must not:

- Drive a motor vehicle such as a car or motorbike
- Use appliances that could be dangerous such as a cooker
- Have a bath without someone there to help you
- Look after children on your own
- Go to work
- Operate any potentially dangerous machinery
- Sign any legal documents
- Take sleeping tablets, drink alcohol or take recreational drugs

You must avoid doing the stated activities until:

What should I expect after the ERCP?

You may have a sore throat from the insertion of the tube which can last up to 48 hours. This will wear off but simple lozenges will help. You may also feel bloated if some of the air has remained in your stomach. To help this, sit upright and if possible walk around.

Pain relieving tablets, such as paracetamol, may be taken at home according to the manufacturers instructions.

If you are worried about any symptoms you experience after this test you may ring the helpline numbers on the front cover of this leaflet.

If you have any problems with a persistent sore throat, worsening chest or abdominal (tummy) pain, swelling of the neck, bleeding from the rectum or passing black faeces (stool), please attend your nearest Accident and Emergency Department taking your report with you.
